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the model presented in this volume draws together various strands of research second language acquisition theory bilingualism research dynamic systems theory to develop a novel approach to this challenging subject its main focus lies on the psycholinguistic dynamics of multilingualism the processes of change in time affecting two or more language systems

the analysis and understanding of multilingualism and its relationship to identity in the face of globalization migration and the increasing dominance of english as a lingua franca makes it a complex and challenging problem that requires insights from a range of disciplines with reference to a variety of languages and contexts this book offers fascinating insights into multilingual identity from a team of world renowned scholars working from a range of different theoretical and methodological perspectives three overarching themes are explored situatedness identity practices and investment and detailed case studies from different linguistic and cultural contexts are included throughout the chapter authors consideration of multilingualism as resource challenges the conception of multilingualism as problem which has dogged so much political thinking in late modernity the studies offer a critical lens on the types of linguistic repertoire that are celebrated and valued and introduce the policy implications of their findings for education and wider social issues

multilingualism is a typical aspect of everyday life for most of the world s population it has existed since the beginning of humanity and among individuals of all backgrounds nonetheless it has often been treated as a variant of bilingualism or as a phenomenon unique to individual areas of study the purpose of this book is to review current knowledge about the acquisition use and loss of multiple languages using a multidisciplinary perspective highlighting the common themes and stimulating insights that can emerge when multilingualism is viewed from different but related areas of investigation the chapters focus on research evidence showing that multilingualism is a complex phenomenon that involves a myriad of linguistic and extra linguistic forces and that should be studied in its own right as evidence of human potential and capacity for language the book is primarily addressed to students and scholars interested in deepening their understanding of the different facets of multilingualism including the individual and societal circumstances that contribute to it the cognitive

positive emotions such as foreign language enjoyment have an active role in the foreign language learning process these and other topics will be discussed in this book with the aim of understanding multilingualism how languages are learned and how to teach them better this book was originally published as a special issue of the international journal of multilingualism

the notion of the native speaker and its undertones of ultimate language competence language ownership and social status has been problematized by various researchers arguing that the ensuing monolingual norms and assumptions are flawed or inequitable in a global super diverse world however such norms are still ubiquitous in educational institutional and social settings in political structures and in research paradigms this collection offers voices from various contexts and corners of the world and further challenges the native speaker construct adopting poststructuralist and postcolonial perspectives it includes conceptual methodological educational and practice oriented contributions topics span language minorities intercomprehension plurilingualism and pluriculturalism translanguaging teacher education new speakers language background profiling heritage languages and learner identity among others collectively the authors paint the portrait of the changing face of the native speaker while also strengthening a new global agenda in multilingualism and social justice these diverse and interconnected contributions are meant to inspire researchers university students educators policy makers and beyond
